farm, & also gave some land
to the council for a playing
field also called Goddard's ^{GREEN} Green.

trade.

ERNEST (MY GRANDFATHER) AMY. L. &
SIDNEY.

My Great Great Grandfather. (The father
of Lewis Lane) was named
William Goddard & was born
around 1811, whereabouts unknown.
He married a Hannah Lane, (hence
the Lane in Lewis Lane) They also
had a daughter Louisa, judging
by the 1841 census, but I believe he
had more than two children.
He was a Timber Merchant by trade.

Dear Mrs Trunley,

Welcome back to the association.

Firstly, Goddard's Green. There are several places in the country with that name - two in Kent, one near Beneden and the other near Cranbrook; one in West Sussex; and one in Berkshire, map reference is SU6666 near Crowthorne. which is near Finchampstead and Sandhurst.

Richard of Malvern, the Newsletter editor holds a stock of old ones and I believe he charges 50p each. His address is on the back of the Newsletter.

John Goddard of Accrington did a little research before passing your letter on to me and he has the following:

Ernest Goddard was a butcher born around 1869 at Odiham, Hants.
His children were: Albert Victor b. 1894; Ernest Frank born 1896, killed First World War; Sidney b 1899; Dorcas, born 1901; Lewis Lane b 1906; Ivy Louisa b 1909; Elsie May born 1915; Ronald born 1918.

I had a look at the widow, Naomi Goddard. She was born Naomi Allaway in Finchampstead, her parents being Nimrod and Naomi Allaway. I see from the I.G.I. that the Allaways were living in Finchampstead as early as the 1660s - the name is indexed under "Holloway" so perhaps you missed it. Naomi had a brother named Nimrod Edward Allaway born in 1834. And Nimrod the father was born in 1809 the son of John and Ann Allaway. I wonder why "Nimrod" - perhaps they had run out of the usual names. Nimrod is from the Bible where he is described as "a mighty hunter".

I also looked at the 1881 census to see if William born 1811 was still alive then. There are two or three William Goddards born in 1811 or 1810, but none that fit the description you give ie the wife's name is wrong or the occupation is more clerical than manual. You may have some difficulty in pinning his origins down, but I will send in your account to the Newsletter editor and it will probably be printed in the Newsletter in the Autumn. Ideally I would like members to send in their own story or else it seems that I am writing most of the Newsletter and it is the member's paper not mine!

Yateley Historical Association are compiling the family histories of four local families for their 2001 project - one of them being Goddards. I will send them your details as Yateley is not very far away from Waltham St Lawrence and the other places.

Mrs Iris Trunley has rejoined the association and hopes to make some more progress with her family tree. She writes "My great grandfather was Lewis Lane Goddard, a horse dealer. He was born in Waltham St Lawrence or Cookham Berks., on 1st August 1838. He married a lady named Naomi whose maiden name was Allaway and came from Finchampstead and was the daughter of Nimrod and Naomi Allaway; very Biblical names. The father of Lewis Lane Goddard was William Goddard who was born around 1811 and married Hannah Lane. William was a timber merchant but his origins are unknown. Lewis Lane Goddard and his bride were married on May 2nd 1864 in the parish church of St James, Westminster, and are reputed to have been well off, owning Goddard's farm and giving some land, named Goddard's Green to the council as a recreation area - presumably the Goddard's Green near Crowthorne."

Mrs Trunley is descended from Ernest Goddard who was a butcher born in Odiham, Hants., through his son also named Lewis Lane Goddard. Can anyone help Mrs Trunley to fill in some more details on her family tree - write to her at 27 Hampton Close, Bradwell Village, Milton Keynes, MK13 9DG.

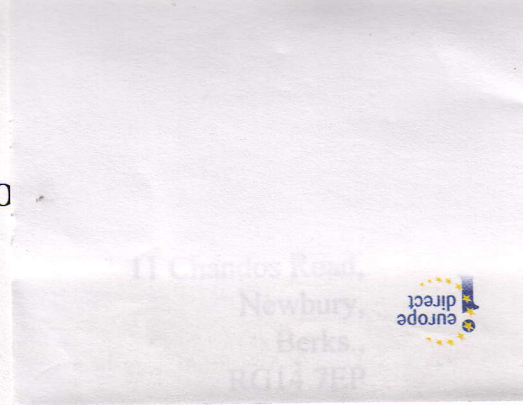
on Owen Goddard or James Lane, is it possible you have any info on them or perhaps your readers can help me.

Dear Mrs Trunley,

I have run off a copy of the Goddards around Newbury in 1851, but I think that you were looking further east between Reading and Newbury so I have put in the Brimpton sheet.

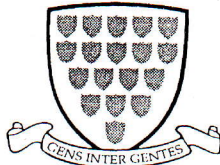
If you have a specific name or location I can look it up for you in the library but Newbury only have West Berkshire sections of the 1851, 61, 71, 91 census and the whole of the 1881.

In the Genealogical Research Directory 2001 I see that there is no one collecting Allaways of Berkshire, but someone collecting Wilder not Wildey in Sulham. He has an e-mail address and I can ask him if you think it might be helpful. You might find it helpful to familiarise yourself with such directories. I had a look at the List of names that Berkshire Family History Society members are researching but find that I only have the 1994 list and it would be too out of date I think. If you belong to the Berks FHS you can consult the current list, or if you can visit their Research Centre next to the Berkshire Record Office in Reading, you would find it there.

Thank you for your letter of the 8th August.

I do not think that we are going to be able to help you much. John Goddards are two a penny in Berkshire and Hampshire. They are especially frequent around Winchfield in Hants. near to Hawley and Cove and Yateley.

However there are several in the villages near Winkfield, Berkshire. As you have the name Owen in the family you could contact Mrs Iris Trunley, whose Goddard ancestors came from Finchampstead, Berks. and have Owen in each generation. Her address is

27 Hampson Close, Bradwell Village, Milton Keynes, MK13 9DG.

She has an e-mail address but I cannot put my hand on it at the moment.

I would hazard a guess that your John Goddard found reading and writing difficult and so did not assist the census enumerator, or parish clerk when asked where he came from. I should therefore be sceptical about any records he left behind – even his age.

Have you thought of trying a lateral approach? What are the names of the witnesses at John's weddings? It is usual to have a brother or sister, or other close relative sign the register.

As a member of the Goddard Association you are able to advertise in the Newsletter. Write a short account of your family and send it to the editor, Richard of Malvern, whose address is on the back page.

Dear Brian and Julie

I am a member of the Goddard Society, and I wonder if you or any other members can help me surmount a "brick wall" I have come up against in my quest for Goddard ancestors.

I know quite a lot about my great-grandfather John Goddard, but have been unable to progress back any further or to find if John had any siblings.

From the ages John gave on various censuses ~~was returns~~ and on his two marriage certificates he was born in 1833 or 1834. On some census returns he gave his place of birth as Winkfield Berks, and on others as Windfield Hants. I rang the CROs at Reading and Winchester ~~to~~ to find out when I could search their parish records, and in each case I was lucky enough

to catch them at a quiet time when their staff were able to do the search for me there and then while I was on the phone. However, in each case they failed to find the birth of a John Goddard.

John's first marriage, to Caroline Chamberlain, took place at Holy Trinity Church Westminster on October 2nd 1862. John's address was Dillington St, his occupation was Bricklayer and his father was Thomas Goddard, Farmer. John was not at Dillington St. at the time of the 1861 Census.

After their marriage John and Caroline moved to Fulham, and later to Friern Barnet. They had three children: John, Martha and Robert (my grandfather). Martha died in 1877, and her mother Caroline in 1879.

On June 6 1881 John married his second wife Henrietta Taylor at St Mary's Church Hornsey. Again he described himself as a bricklayer, and this time

his father Thomas was also described as a bricklayer. John's address was shown as 44 St. Joseph's Rd. By the time of the census that year they were in High Barnet again, and they were still there at the time of John's death in 1911. John's marriage to Henrietta had produced ~~4~~ five children by the time of the 1891 census; George, Owen, Matilda, Ruth and William. I know Owen was killed in WWI. I still haven't checked the 1901 census completely as I've had trouble with my credit card and am reluctant to give its details over the Internet. I have tried Genes Connected, but with no luck so far. I really would love to know if any of your members have John in their family tree, and if they know anything about his parents.

To Margaret my wife, my house and land in Everslye, county of Southampton, for life, the remainder with all the deeds etc to Elizabeth my daughter and her heirs.

Lease of land and house where I now dwell in Arborfield, which I hold of the President and Scholars of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, to be renewed by my wife 4 years after my death, to go to the child which is to be born, if it be a son.

To Margaret my daughter lease of tenement in Maidenhead parish of Cookham, which I hold of Eton College and £10 at 18.

Brother Walter Goddard.

William Heath, my sister's son.

John Tanner of Reading, bellows-maker.

Residue to my wife who is sole executrix, and who is to enter into a bond for £80 with Jonas Newman her father, or John Newman her brother for due performance of executorship. If wife refuses then my 2 daughters Elizabeth and Margaret to be joint executors.

Overseers: Brother Walter Goddard, John Tanner of Reading, and my neighbour Edward Mays.

Witnesses: Thomas Wilford and Edward Mays.

Proved 11 June 1613 by relict.

P.C.C., 60, Capell.

1656

James Goddard of ffuchampstead [Finchampstead], co. Berks., turner.

Will dated 20 April 1656.

To be buried as near to my father as may be in churchyard of Finchampstead.

My tenement and lands where I now dwell, also that tenement and lands in Finchampstead now in occupation of John Pither, to wife Ursula.

Daughters Marie, Anne, Elizabeth, sons Samuel and John £20 a piece.

To be raised and paid by son James or whoever shall be happen to be heir to my lands at the decease of self and wife.

Residue to wife who is sole executrix.

Proved in London 14 April 1658 by Ursula Goddard the relict.

P.C.C., 229, Wotton.

1711

James Goddard of Finchampstead, co. Berks., tailor.

Will dated 18 July 1711.

To son-in-law Creswell and his son Robert, and son-in-law Samuel Paice 1s a piece.

To wife the messuage or tenement where I live in Finchampstead and all the lands belonging, viz. "Carry Croft", "Stony Piddle" and one piece of meadow ground for her life.

After her decease, messuage where I now dwell called "Matches" and all the land belonging (about five acres) to grandson John Parker and his heirs forever, chargeable with payment of £20 a piece to his brothers James and Edward and his sister Mary.

Parcels of ground called "Carry Croft", "Stony Piddle", and the meadow to daughter Elizabeth Goodyn, wife of John Goodyn of Ockingham co. Berks., painter, for her life.

At her decease same to grandson John Goodwyn and his heirs, chargeable with payment of £10 apiece to his brothers James, Thomas, Samuel and William, and his sisters Elizabeth, Mary and Ann.

Residue of estate to wife Mary Goddard, who is full executrix.

Witnesses: Mary Read, Richard Oliver, Edw. Lamport.

Proved at Reading 21 May 1713 by Mary Goddard the relict.
