Hi Julie, thanks for your reply, but had already returned the records to you, thinking that I might have sufficient to take me further along the trail.

Shall consult with the Nottingham Archives regarding obtaining various certificates.

Am hoping that the information that was on the 1881 census, combined with the information given in the 1851 census will give me great and great grandparents. As the latter will be prior to the implementation of the Records will have to again ask the Nottm. Archives to point me as to where the record will be kept.

Have the Shinefield parish records be lodged with the county archives, and are they accessible for viewing?

By the time you receive this my envelope should be with you, but one of the things that I did not ask you to tell me, which are or were the adjoining parishes that I should look at.

If it is not to much of a pain, perhaps you will return to me for further investigation the census returns.

In an earlier email you said that you did not think that anyone had done the Shinfield Goddards, and i wonder if based upon the information that you have provided if anyone else similar to Mrs Pither have had a look. Bearing in mind that one of their forebears was married to a daughter of a Goddard. As you will have now seen that a William Goddard, was working for an Abraham Pither, who could well have been the grand child of Anne Pither who died in 1844, and who left him a legacy, and was now a farmer in Shinfield in 1881. cheers, Ted Marshall.

Records of births marriages and deaths in the UK since the July of 1837 have been made and are filed at the Public Record Office. This is not to say that every BMD is there as everyone is fallible and there was no penalty for many years to deter people for thinking "blow the laws, I'm not traipsing into town to register the baby" - my great grandfather among them. People became more eager to register when you had to prove your age in order to get a pension. I am not right up to date with the addresses to which to write for certificates nowadays and would advise you to get a good up to date book and check the latest facts. I hope that you have already got a copy of Family Tree Magazine and/or Practical Family History where advice can be obtained. Do you know the exact date of the births marriages and deaths ? If not you will have to pay extra as someone will have to search through the records for them. There are indexes to the public records in large

libraries. Nottingham Library should be big enough If my memory of it is correct. Otherwise you can obtain certificates through me from an agent I use who gives a small discount.

I will ask Mrs Barbara Young if she can provide the date of the newspaper item about Henry.

Before you return the 1881 census I lent you I would suggest that you make a note of other Goddards in adjacent villages for when you get a generation further back.

Hi Julie, thanks for the information re Margaret Young, but from the information that she forwarded am unable to see a link, but it might emerge some time later.

Now going back to information that you forwarded in November last, from a Mrs Barbara Young, and the 1851 census.

I would welcome the opportunity of emailing with her, as think that one of the families that she lists were the parents of my great grandfather George Goddard, about whom you sent me the 1881 census extract.

The f30 reference shows a George Goddard as being 15 at that 1851 census, and the 1881 shows a George Goddard of 45 and with a family, the youngest of whom appears to be my grandfather, Daniel.

I have recently written to the Vicar of Shinfield to ask if I might place an advert in the Parish Magazine, see what local information on Goddards still extant in the area, might generate.

I have obtained a photo copy from the Phillimore parish boundaries but that does not show an East Shinfield, or Shinfield on Loddon, so is there another map available? would it be from the Berkshire records office?

Hear from you as and when, cheers, Ted.

Hi Julie, very many thanks for your reply and for suggesting that I should consult with Peter Goddard in Toronto. This I did, and he has been able to provide me with a wealth of detail regarding the Shinfield Goddard's and where their deaths were registered, as it happens this was in Wokingham.

The curious thing that has now arisen, following on with this information, I wrote and phoned the Rev. Owen Murphy current vicar of Shinfield. He consulted his registers and could find no trace of Goddard burials for a very long time, and certainly not any record at first viewing of Henry Goddard, but according to the newspaper cutting of the time, he was laid to rest alongside his wife in the Shinfield cemetery/churchyard.

Am I able to ask of you to have a look at the 1871 census, to see who was registered as living at 74, Crescent Road, Reading, as in 1897 my grandparents were married from there, my grandmother naughty girl was 6 months pregnant, according to the marriage certificate the banns were read at St Bartholomew Reading, and that is where she was married.

Dear Ted

I have scanned the existing Burial Register which dates back to 1907 and there is not one Goddard recorded. I have also looked at the burial of ashes record which dates back to the 1960's and that also does not contain one Goddard.

In the village however we do have a 'Goddard Close', presumably named after some local notary. I have also looked in the local telephone directory for reading and there are lots of Goddards, but none in Shinfield - but they could have moved. If you can get access to a good Reference Library they should telephone directories from around the country and you ring them all directly. I will also forward your email on to one of our churchwardens, Chris Young, who is a member of the local history group, and he might be able to help. Hope your search is successful

Thank you for your letter of 16 November regarding the enquiry on the Goddards of Shinfield.

I have no objection to you giving my name and address to Ted Marshall, but I don't know if I can help him very much. I may have some miscellaneous reference in my notes but my own research has not covered Shinfield.

From the 1851 census index I can give you the following:
HO 107 1693

- f.21 Jonathan 49, Harriet 36, Mary 11 & Jane 10
- f.26 Elizabeth 32, Elizabeth 6, Thomas 3 & William 1
- f.30 Charles 47, Sarah 38, George 15, Charles 12, John 8,
Henry 5 & Daniel 3.
- f.36 William 47 & Sarah 51

I would imagine that folio 30 is the one wanted. These are all at East Shinfield.

My current research includes the family of Richard Goddard, farmer of Sherfield on Lodden, who died in 1810. He does not appear to have left a will but his parents Luke & Ann, did. When I have finished this research I will let you have details but this is not imminent as I need to go to Winchester Hants CRO.

If I find anything of interest I will forward such to you.

one—was under wheat and beans. Wheat sometimes fetched £5 a quarter, and farm labourers' wages were then 9/- or 10/- a week, while big youths could be found to work for 4/- or 4/6 a week. He remembered the threshing machine being introduced in the district, and the first mowing machine making its appearance on Whitely Park Farm. Mr. Goddard's father had no first drilling machine and afterwards bought four or five, which were hired out with a man to farmers within 2 radius of five or six miles. Another recollection of his was of the farmers' corn waggons standing in the London Street, and sacks of corn being carried to the market on men's backs. Corn was then bought on the sample sack. Mr. Goddard knew every yard of the district and was frequently consulted on farm drainage and other matters.

Mr. Goddard was a staunch Conservative, and for many years was chairman of the Shinfield Conservative Association. He leaves one son, Mr. Henry Goddard, who is engaged in the building trade.

The Funeral.

The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon in the centuries old Shinfield Parish Church, the service being conducted by the Rev. Ll. Rice, vicar, with Mrs. Rice at the organ. After the service, which was of a brief nature, the remains were interred in the grave of the late Mr. Goddard's wife. The family mourners were: Mr. and Mrs. Goddard (son and daughter), Vera Allen (granddaughter), Mr. J. Cusdin (brother), Mr. and Mrs. A. Lucas, Mr. A. Tait, Mr. and Mrs. Good, Mr. A. Causton, Miss N. Smith, Miss Jeacocke.

Amongst those present were Mr. Eric Palmer, Mr. A. Fox Mr. and Mrs. David Cooper, Mr. F. Grover, Miss K. Smith, Mr. F. R. Grover,

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Daniel Goddard married Lillian Louise Goddard (nee Huggins) June quarter 1897. He died 12/07/1932. She died 1953; they are both buried in same grave in Abingdon Cemetery. They had four children, Daniel who was killed in 1st World War, and is on the Abingdon War Memorial. His brother William (Billy) was drowned young, do not know date, need to check coroners records. Ethel Gladys born 1908 married RCC Aston had two children, Clifford died in air accident (3 Children) and Daniel (2 children).
Marie Louise born 1912 died 1992. She married James Edward Marshall 1936 Abingdon St Helens. Two children Edward Stuart Peter, and Jean Esme.

Dear Julie,

I was thinking that, when you mentioned Henry Goddard in your first letter, there was some mistake as there was no Henry in my Reluctant Bride.

However, I've now checked my 'Goddard' file & found the article BUT I didn't send you this.

It is with the copies you sent me from John & Bergl Pither so perhaps it came from them.

It is dated August 28 1926 but has no source.

To me, it appears to come from a scrapbook - it looks like cuttings from one of the local newspapers & at the bottom of the page it suggests further pages of a book. There is another cutting on the left hand side, which is incomplete but refers to 'Dr Selpy' & 'Talfourd' - I recognise these names but can't remember why - perhaps they are Reading men.

I'm sorry I can't help more at present, but would suggest Alan Hankin at Reading Local Studies library may be able to help (he has a good memory & access to their name index), & Reading (Rural life) University may have this and/or further items in their farming archives.

Thank you for the Sherfield on Hodden information. I will let you know if I find more on this road name. It may be from the family I'm researching or be after a more recent Goddard.
