We put the exhibition in Yateley Library on Wednesday 17 April, and took it down yesterday so it had its full six weeks as usual. As you know it was entitled 'Four Yateley Families', so we got some feedback on the Bunch and the Goddard families. We were not expecting any on the FitzRoy or Cave families, since there are no local descendants. I am giving a talk to the annual gathering of the Cave Society (a GOON) at Stanford Hall on Saturday, and they have several descendants of the Yateley family attending from distant places.

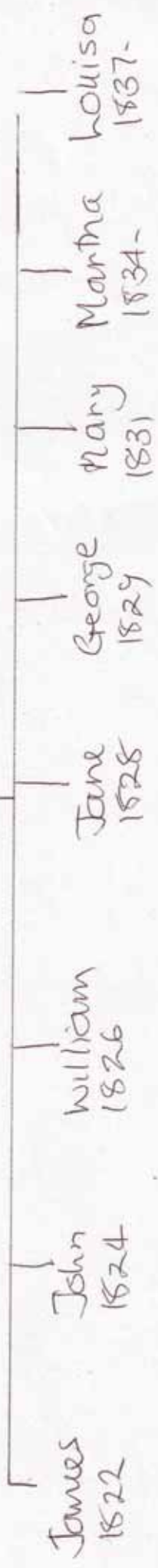
The feedback from local Goddards was not overwhelming considering the numbers in the phone book -- in fact disappointing. However we did get one very good contact and I have to add his tree to my work.

Although I was able to place every single Bunch occurring in all the Yateley records (BMD, census and manorial court books) on a tree as descendants of one William Bunch who migrated to Yateley in about 1740, I could not make such progress for the local Goddard family. This is because the Goddards were a larger family straddling about 5 or six parishes, and the individual members migrated back and forth. So unless I have digital versions of all the parish records and the six censuses for each parish I don't think I shall make much more progress on my own. I was hoping that individual family historians might come forward (as one did) with a tree which took him through three parishes, but did not link to any I already had. So I have ended up with lots of individual trees mostly running for a maximum of three or four generations. I will send you a gedcom version when I can sort things out a bit.

Julie. Yes! I am supposed to be mounting the "Four Yateley Families" Local History Week exhibition in Yateley Library next Wednesday, 17 April 2002. We have completed writing the Fitzroy, Cave and Bunch display boards. So I still have to finalise the Goddard board.

We are intending to feature the full family trees of the Bunch and Goddard families to include every single Bunch and Goddard included in the baptisms, marriages, burials, census (1841 to 1891) and manorial court books. I have extracted all this data and entered it all into a genealogical programme -- right down to 1900. Data Projection precludes us including living people.

I have been able to tie every single BUNCH (182 persons) as a descendant of one of three BUNCH males who came to Yateley in about 1740 (the male lined of the other two died out). So I have ended up with a single Bunch tree which, when printed out, extends over 4.5 metres wide. This feat was mostly achieved by using the census data and the manorial court books.

However for the GODDARD family I have ended up with 15 separate small trees (so far including 139 persons), which I have failed miserably to interconnect. I suspect they will interconnect eventually but I do not have factual evidence. I don't have either the Hawley census records nor the Hawley manorial court books on my computer at home so it will be a lengthy process to extract all the Goddard entries. Also I have not used wills nor the GRO for any of my research.

I am therefore going to mount the Goddard trees separately on the display boards (they are being glued up right now). I am also going to put up a 'public plea' asking the general public if they can connect the separate trees. The Yateley Library tells me there are many Goddards registered as book borrowers. There are also many in the local telephone directories. Also I suspect there will be many people descended via female lines (as they tend to remember their lineage better than males). So we are placing a book with the librarians asking for comments.

If you think the items you have sent to Ernest should be included in our exhibition please send them to me as soon as possible.

Also by copy of this email to Ernest I will ask him if he has found anything more which he would like included.

Dear Pat,

Thank you for your letter.

I have passed on your story about the three Goddards at the graduation ceremony to Richard, for the Newsletter. It is just the type of information that should go into the Newsletter, but which people do not tell us.

With regard to your family tree and Goddard enquiries:

According to my notes you had decided that the father of William Goddard who married Pamela Gooby, were George Goddard and Elizabeth Wigg of North Waltham who were married 4 Nov 1745.

You would not be able to get a birth certificate for Stephen born 1792 because they were not begun being issued until 1837, and were not compulsory for another 50 or so years. The only record you would find would be his baptism record in Silchester parish church register - if he was Church of England.

* Secondly, **George Goddard of Hawley**; there were, and are, a great many Goddards in Hampshire.

In the 1851 census **George** was living at home with his parents

James Goddard aged 44 born Hawley

Martha Goddard aged 43 born Windsor, Berkshire

Jane Goddard aged 16 born Hawley

Ellen Goddard aged 14 born Hawley

George Goddard aged 12 born Hawley

William Goddard aged 8 born Hawley

Martha Goddard aged 6 born Hawley

Emma Goddard aged 4 born Hawley

James had married Martha Giles at Hawley on 2 Sept 1828.

There were 79 Goddards living in the 1851 Hawley census area so I think that the family is firmly fixed in this area.

George as a hotelkeeper could have moved from town to town, but unless you have any firm evidence that he came from Oakley or Silchester, then I would not think it likely.

Regarding **Charles Goddard** the brewer of Salisbury. There are two **Charles Goddard** in Salisbury St Martins parish in the 1851 census

Charles Goddard aged 44 born Salisbury

Mary Ann Goddard aged 36 born Romsey, Hampshire

John aged 10 born Eling, Hampshire

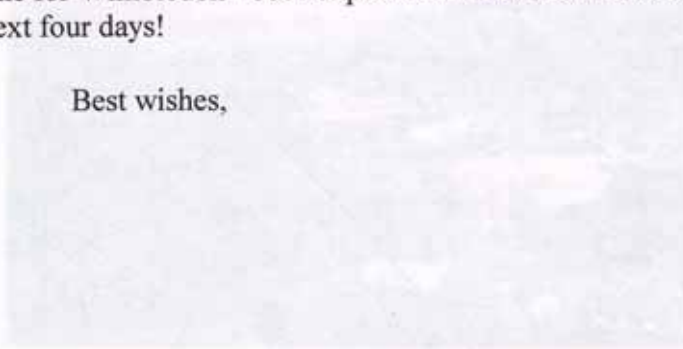
and

Charles N. Goddard aged 54, his wife Ann and at least five children.

No mention of a **Thomas** in either family. Looking in detail at the 1851 census of Salisbury would tell which Charles your enquirer was looking for as it would show the occupation - which I do not have in my notes.

We are having a depressing and gloomy summer here, weather-wise. So far it has kept fine for Wimbledon - but I expect that I have now broken the spell and it will pour for the next four days!

Dear Julie,

Sorry that I have been so tardy about keeping in touch. Hopefully you will, now, have my two-part email from earlier this afternoon! Alas there was no response to my request for help about my great uncles and aunts in the Goddard newsletter. I guess that I will have to take a trip to Farnborough and/or Aldershot libraries that appear to have some promising resources. Going backwards, as it were, the original parish register for St.Peter's, Farnborough (older I think than St.Peter's, Yateley) is a most likely source; it is kept at Surrey RO at Woking. I have looked at transcripts at Winchester RO but they are of too poor quality. As you will see from my attachment I have located a Philip, c1606 who *may* be related to Holland and might well be the father of Jane and Richard. No details, however, on Richards descendents.

Do keep me in touch with any interesting developments.
