Dear Mrs Goddard

When I enquired about the Goddard Association you enclosed a postcard with a note asking if you could help me with my Goddards of East Woodhay. I am now a member (No. 22026) and would be most interested in any information you have.

My ggg-grandmother was a Mary Goddard who was born at East Woodhay. She married William Awbery at St Martin's EW on January 11, 1802. They had 8 surviving children and she died aged 78 on August 4, 1855, and is buried at St Thomas, Woolton Hill.

I have not been able to trace Mary's family with certainty as there are several possible 'Mary Goddard' baptisms at EW that fit. There are 2 baptismal entries on November 3, 1776, a Mary with parents John & Mary and a Mary with parents William & Mary. There are 2 more entries in 1777, both with John Goddard as father. There were a lot of Goddards around at the time and I have not been able to find out any more.

Any help you could give would be most welcome.

Dear Mr Aubrey,

I fear that I might have misled you when I said that I could help you with your Goddard ancestry in East Woodhay. I do have some records and I had been expecting to be visited by the East Woodhay Local History Association whom I thought would know even more. However, since promising to phone me back and arrange a meeting last April I have heard nothing. A phone call last night has rearranged the time when they will contact me again and now they hope to come in September - some time.

I think that I can fairly safely say that the William and Mary who had a daughter Mary in 1776 were the vicar and his wife; which leaves you with the other John and Mary in that year. Did you know that the East Woodhay Goddards were of the Swindon, Aldbourne, Ogbourne St George family? They lived at the big house next to the church named Stagroves. Later sons of the family became the vicar of East Woodhay (and later West Woodhay) and that they held the same position in Castle Eaton in Oxfordshire at the same time. We can supply a family tree for this family, but I think that yours were of their parishioners and were farm labourers. Correct me if I am wrong. If so then you might have a difficult task in tracing them as they moved quite often. Other places to look are Litchfield, Hampshire;; Kintbury and Hampstead Marshall - the last two in Berkshire- where we have found Goddards from elsewhere.

Fingers crossed and we may have our Newbury bypass soon and a visit to Winchester will not mean risking sitting in a traffic jam on the A34. Then I might be able to look at East Woodhay in more depth. I was told last night that the vicar's wife in the early 1700s, Elizabeth Goddard, had left meticulous accounts of her fund raising for the extravagant Goddard memorial in the church. I do not know whether it contains such mundane items as the names of donors in East Woodhay, which might have helped distinguish one Goddard from another. I find that we do have some records from the parish registers of East Woodhay (copies enclosed, but accuracy not guaranteed) and also the 1851 census details.

If you can give further details of your family, make a news item of it, and send it to Richard Goddard the Newsletter editor (address on back of Newsletter) then it will go out to all GAE members. In the meantime I will keep a note of your request and work on it.

Dear Richard,

Enclosed are a picture of the monument in St Martins, East Woodhay and details of the inscription under it.

Edward Goddard's will is interesting; he says that he wishes to be buried at East Woodhay "but not until eight years after my decease". I wonder where he was to be kept for the eight years!

His executors are to spend £100 on a monument in the parish church within three years of his death. Perhaps he thought that it would take five years to complete the monument. In the event, I gather that the widow was reduced to writing to all and sundry asking for contributions (I am told that the letters survive). Nothing changes does it?

I gather that the church needs £40,000 spending on it, but the monument, luckily, only needs about £80 for sealant.

I hope that the church warden I spoke to does write to you and that the committee feels able to help. The Palgrave One-name Society assists in upkeep of Palgrave church and holds a service there each year. The John and Frances West Family Society put a wreath on their memorial in Newbury parish church and the Silverthorne Family annually do the same to the Silverthorne memorial in Steeple Ashton, Wilts.

Near this place
lies the body of EDWARD GODDARD Esq., son of WILLIAM GODDARD Esq.,
late of this parish, by ELIZABETH his wife, who was the daughter of JOHN
D'OYLEY Esq., an ancient and honourable family in the County of Oxford
He married ELIZABETH the daughter of EDWARD GODDARD Esq., of Ogbourne
St Andrews in the County of Wilts. by whom he had no issue.
He was a person of sober life and conversation, constant in his devotions
both publick and private Whom neither the
pleasures of the age did
Lead into excess nor the vices corrupt.
By his last will he testified his respect for the House of God both in his parish and
in that of his manor(sic) of Castle Eaton in the County of Wilts. both of which Parishes
the Poor also will receive lasting tokens of his charity

He died 7th day of October 1724 Aged 65

ELIZABETH, his wife, died 30th September 1732 aged 72
