

ABSTRACT OF THE WILL OF EDWARD GODDARD

Edward Goddard of "Stargroves" parish of East Woodhay, co. Southampton, gent. Will dated 17 March 1722. To be buried at East Woodhay, but not until 8 years after my decease. Executors within 3 years after decease to spend £100 in a monumnet in the parish church.

To wife Elizabeth all furniture in her chamber and all such plate as was hers at time of marriage and use of furniture at "Stargroves", at her decease all furniture to such persons as "Stargroves" descends to under marriage settlement.

One year's wages to all men and women servants who shall have been with me three years.

To the poor of East Woodhay and Castle eaton.

All manors, messuages, lands, etc. shall remain as by deed tripartite, dated 17 March 1722, made between me Edward Goddard of the first part, John Doyley of Chiselhampton, co. Oxon, Bart, Thomas Jervoise of Herriot, co. Southampton Esq., and Richard Goddard pf Swindon. co Wilts., Esq., second part, and Charles Doyly of Southropp, co. Glos, Esq., and Alexander Ready of Fairford, co. Glos., gent. of thrid part, according to custom of Manor of East Woodhay.

Wife to receive profits of all copyhold lands and tentsd. in said manor and held by 15 copys of Court Rolls, except farm called "Knights Farm" which is to be sold to pay debts. By indenture dated 9 Feb 1690 the Rt Rev father in God, Peter, late Bishop of Winchester, demised to me the manor of East Woodhay for my and my wife's life and for the life of William Goddard of Dunfield, parish of Kempsford, co. Glos., and now of Castle Eaton, co. Wilts., 3rd son of Henry Goddard, then late of Castle Eaton, gent., deceased, and the life of the longest liver; said manor in trust for Edward Goddard, clerk, eldest son of said Henry Goddard, deceased.

£100 to buy a great bell for East Woodhay Church and £100 for ceiling, whitewashing, and ornamenting said church with paint

£50 to buy a bell for Castle Eaton church.

Kinsmen William and Henry Goddard, sons of Henry, late of Castle Eaton, dec., Edward and William Goddard, brothers of said deceased and Cule Goddard, son of edward Goddard pf castle eaton, £5 for mourning and 2os for a ring apiece.

Executors in trust, wife and Sir John Doyly, to see debts and legacies paid.

Edward Goddard, clerk, son of Henry Goddard, dec. sole executor and residuary legatee.

An abstract of his will

Will dated 8 July 1797

£1500 life insurance in the Society for Equitable Insurances, by instrument dated 4 May 1796 to Robert Stokes Sloper of Gray's Inn, co. Middlesex, Esq., and William Elderton Allen of same, Esq., in trust to pay dividends to wife Anna Maria Goddard for her life; at her death to be equally divided between child or children, if more than one, excepting an eldest son or only son at 21; if no children to wife absolutely; rest of estate to wife.

Witnesses: Robert S. Sloper, Ch. Th. Rayment, W. E. Allen.

Proved 16 January 1798 by executor Robert Stokes Sloper.

Reference P.C.C. Wills, 27, Walpole.

Note: 1) William Goddard died on a voyage to Lisbon, presumably the will was made before he left as a safeguard.

Mrs Anna Maria Goddard, his widow died at 24 at Longbridge Deverill and was buried 9th June 1798.

2) The Slopers lived in the Manor House at West Woodhay

EDWARD GODDARD of Stargroves, parish of East Woodhay, co. S'hants, Esq. Will dated 17 December 1790. To be buried in a plain and private manner with late wife in family vault at East Woodhay, in an elm coffin which is already provided. To be kept at least a week before my coffin is closed, and then carried to the church at about 11 in the forenoon by six poor men of the parish, without any pall bearer; bearers to have $\frac{1}{2}$ guinea each. To eldest son William Goddard £100. To friends Rev. Thomas Sheppard, D.D., Rector of Ampport, co. S'hants, and Nicholas Townsend of Newbury, co. Berks, the advowson of the Church of Castle Eaton, co. Wilts, in trust to present son Henry Goddard with same at the next vacancy. The Manor of Castle Eaton and other lands there, expectant on the determination of a term of 600 years, to secure the sum of £5000 on same. The living of Castle Eaton on decease of son Henry Goddard to again become part of the manor. Having raised under trusts for 600 years three sums of £1500, £1600, and £1000, making £4100, part of said £5000, leaving £900 still remaining, and having advanced to son Henry and to dau. Charlotte Doran £600 each (besides other money), being their parts of £300 under marriage settlement with 1st wife, and as I am entitled to share of dau. Mary Goddard, deceased, she having died intestate and administration granted to me, I am entitled to £2700 out of my settled estate, same to be charged for use of daus. Anne Parke Sheppard, wife of Rev. Thomas Sheppard, and Charlotte Doran. Having advanced M^r Henry Stephens who married my dau. Jane, since deceased, sums of money, which if dau. had left issue I had intended forgiving him, such sums to be deducted from her portion. To son Henry Goddard my diamond ring, metal watch with gold seal and gold compass I usually wear. To servant Charles Crist 10 guineas. To Thomas Sheppard and Richard Townsend 5 guineas each. Residue to trustees to pay $\frac{1}{2}$ to son Henry Goddard, the other $\frac{1}{2}$ to such persons as dau. Charlotte Doran shall order.

Executors: Thomas Sheppard, Richard Townsend, and son Henry Goddard.

Proved 7 March 1794 by Thos. Sheppard, Ric. Townsend, and Rev. Henry Goddard, son. (P.C.C., 140, Holman.)

ANNE GODDARD of Bromley, co. Kent, Spinster. Will dated 27 January 1793. To John and Ann Marriott (both infants), children of John Marriott of Bromley, £20, to which I am entitled under the will of my father, deceased, at the death of my mother, equally between them.

Executor, M^r Peter Cary of Goswell Street, parish of S^t Luke's, co. Middlesex.

Witnesses: Sam. fish, Tho^s Wilson.

Proved 15 July 1794. (P.C.C., 368, Holman.)

THOMAS GODDARD of Beaufort Buildings, Strand, co. Middlesex, Gent. Will dated 23 August 1788. To son-in-law M^r John Hooke Greene all my share in the "Poligraphic Socy," on trust that he apply $\frac{1}{2}$ of profit towards discharge of my debts contracted since 1780, the other $\frac{1}{2}$ to pay bro. John Goddard £5 % of such clear profits, the residue of such profits between two daus.-in-law, the sisters of said John Hooke Greene, Elizabeth Maria and Charlotte Goddard, and said John Hooke Green, in equal shares. After debts paid, residue of first $\frac{1}{2}$ divided in like manner. If profits in "Poligraphic Socy" at any time exceed £600 per annum 10 % each to be paid to son-in-law Thomas Goddard, junr., for life and dau.-in-law Harriet Ann Boyd. Residue to dau.-in-law Elizabeth Maria Goddard, who with John Hooke Greene are executors.

JOHN GODDARD of Islington, co. Middlesex. Will dated 15 August 1791. To wife, formerly Mary Devonshire, dau. of James Devonshire and Elizabeth Dobson, all real and personal estate, and appoint her sole executrix.

 - to daughter PLATT, my needlework carpell with the "deepe fringe which she wrought"
 - to loving sister, LADY LUCY, £20 to be bestowed by executrix upon a gold ring with a diamond as a "testimony of my love and respect"
 - to son JOHN HUNGERFORD, payment of the rent of three score pounds yearly on lease of the Manor of Leigh Erly, during the continuance of that lease - to be made by son DUNCH (& his assigns) to whom I have made that lease - son John to have the counterpart of the lease to enable him to recover & receive the rent
 - to my wife - goods, Jewells, plate, armour, books, c[h]attel, furniture & household stuff in my house at Down Ampney and elsewhere - also all debts owing to me at time of decease and the bonds
 - by an Indenture of 28 May 1628 I conveyed my W[.....]more (unclear) of Down Ampney & Latton to Sir Richard LUCY, Knight & Barronet and others in trust to disburse so that if my grandchild BRIDGET DUNCH die before 21 years without issue then the same manors be conveyed by the said Sir Richard Lucy to her living husband at the time of her decease - after his decease the manors to pass to heirs that I shall appoint - if no such husband living then Manors to be conveyed to persons nominated by me - if Bridget DUNCH die before 21 years without issue then the said Sir Richard Lucy & Ors to convey the said manors to my son ANTHONY HUNGERFORD during his natural life - after his decease to any lawful issue.
 - If no such issue then to my four daughters - Bridget, Ladie SISLEY
Elizabeth, Lady RICHARD
Barbara, Lady SACKVILE
Marie PLATT, wife of William Platt Esq
- and to their heirs

- to each of my general & household servants, one whole years wages

- sale of my wood In Forrest of Brayden to my son DUNCH and his heirs - the conveyance contains reference to a mortgate to son DUNCH in respect of land called Ragge and £400 to be paid to DUNCH when the sale takes place, if DUNCH is not living then payment to be made to his wife

Codicil

- If the executrix redeems the mortgate on the land called Ragge, mortgated to son DUNCH, then she and her heirs shall have it for ever
- if executrix sells the Ragge to Countess of Denbigh (according to my promise & agreement) then she shall have the sale money less the payment of mortgate money to son DUNCH plus compensation due to him
- the counterpart of the lease of the Manor of Leight & Erly and the £60 rent previously given to John HUNGERFORD my son to be paid to RICHARD ROBINS my servant in trust for the benefit of my son JOHN as the said Richard Robins shall think fit
- to son JOHN HUNGERFORD, RICHARD ARNOLD my wife's son, and Judeth SWAYNE my wife's grandchild, one close called "the Breach" in Down Ampney, now occupied by John PARTRIDGE
When John Hungerford dies then Richard Arnold shall have it and when he dies Judeth Swayne shall have it

Thomas Goddard 1701-31 was also Rector of North Wraxall and Tidworth. He became chaplain of the House of Commons and was Canon of Windsor.

Lancelot Kirby 1762-97 was buried in the chancel of Castle Eaton so his name on the sanctuary step means that his stone was moved during the Butterfield restorations.

These restorations mean that several memorials were moved either to the back of the church behind the font, or were lifted as stones for the path from the porch.

The graves under the chancel floor, all before 1800, presumably remain. All stones were moved.
