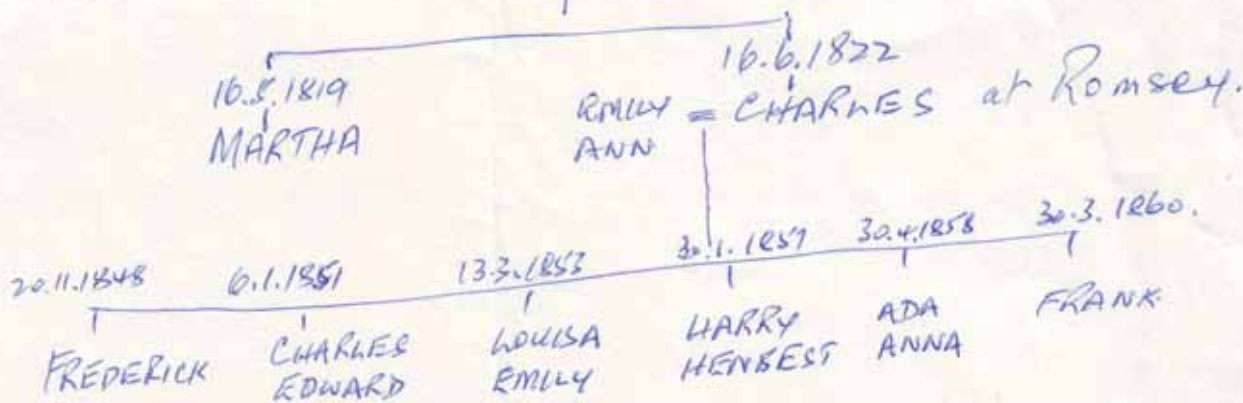

Dear Brian,

I have updated the letter to go with my 'plan' and enclose same. Perhaps you would obliterate the note at the bottom of the first page which you said was wrong.

Another interesting point has arisen since I was last in touch, I noticed in Henry of Dynton's will that he refers to his cousin William of Tollard. Richard of Poole also refers to Tollard as one of his beneficiary parishes. If one of his daughters went to live at Tollard then her children would be cousins to Henry assuming that Henry's father was indeed Richard's son-in-law. Have you any knowledge of the Tollard Goddards? Of course Richard's daughter might have another surname.

With regard to our own trees I have obtained the inventory of John of Botley 1628, and Thomas of Botley 1677 admons in the hope that they might give some clues to our possible common origins, to no avail unfortunately. I still think John might be Henry's brother and Thomas his nephew but there is no proof.

I have now ordered Thomas of Idmiston's will [1654] from Winchester. There was a Thomas born in 1651 at Lockerley to a Thomas Goddard and Anne, my x-gt grandfather Matthew was born about 1652 and his mother was Anne, and Anne was the name of a Goddard who signed some papers about a lease at Romsey. This seems to indicate that she was a widow. I am keeping my fingers crossed.

Dear Julie,

I feel that I am trying to do a jigsaw puzzle with about 70% of the pieces missing, however a small picture does seem to be emerging.

Having noted that John from Poole made a gift to Sedghill poor and finding fairly definite connections with John the son of John and Elizabeth [will 1564]. His brother William refers to his niece Cecill- I wonder if she becomes the wife of Thomas, William's nephew?- I decided to carry on and index the Goddard wills 1417-1605 to see if I could find out anything else.

I made a straight index, then names alphabetically, then places, and then enlarged it to put in places which were mentioned in the individual wills. Just concentrating on the Southampton Poole area I came up with the following. -

- 1564 John of Wynbourne had 5 sons, Walter, Richard, Edmund, William and John. A Nicholas is a witness but there is no indication of where he is from, the first N. from Sedghill would only be in his early teens.
- 1572 Richard of Poole [alderman of Soton, Hants wills index] mentions two brothers John and Edmund. Richard donated to Poole, Witchampton, Tollard and Wimbourne. Daughter Sara to marry Thomas Goddard. 4 more daughters. Note-Henry of Dynton refers to cousin William of Tollard.
- 1580 Thomas Goddard buys Burchenwood, Bramshaw.
- 1590 Edmund of Broughton's will. Hants R.O. He had 2 daughters.
- 1622 Thomas's will. He had 3 sons, Henry [Dynton], William [Milford] and John. John is unaccounted for as yet but there is a will of 1628 at Botley which I want to check. I am hoping that this leads me on to a 1677 will at Botley of Thomas. I have just received your letter re Daniel, unfortunately I sent a request to Winchester this morning

Summarising I am suggesting that Richard is one of John's sons and with four other brothers the next generation might well require an awful lot of land in the area for their farms and with an alderman [and mayor?] and a lawyer in the family they would be in a very favourable position to get it.

For Brian's benefit can I say that John of Castle Eaton's will 1560 puzzles me. He refers to Walter and William 2 sons of his brother. Could John of Wynbourne be his brother? Another case of John the elder and John the younger?

If you should come across any ideas to back up my supposition in the future perhaps you will let me know.

I am enclosing a copy of the Goddard of Sedghill pedigree and also the will indexes 1417-1605 in the hope that you and Brian will find them useful. I regret that there is no chance of my coming to Newbury in the near future but thanks for the offer.

Dear Edward,

thank you for your letter which yesterday morning . I will put your table together and shrink on a Xerox machine in preparation to sending it off to Richard of Malvern next week for publication. However, do not hold your breath, I know that he has just finished the next copy of the newsletter as he asked me to rush through an obituary notice for the dead line, which was some ten days ago and that he has several articles already waiting.

We do not have any information yet for the Goddards of Tollard Royal, apart from seeing that it is probably a large family group, I have a very fragmented tree. (several families?), from the villages of Donhead St Mary the next village Donhead St Andrew, both only a stones throw from Sedgemoor and from Mere. I do think that this area is one which could be rewarding, although I suspect that there are at least three unrelated families in those villages.

I have been unable to locate the book "Armorial Achievements", so far there does not seem to be a copy on record in either Wiltshire or Berkshire, but I have to go up to London at the end of the month so I hope to find time to go to the Society of Genealogists to check their library. However, in case you come across this book in your area, could you copy anything associated with the "Goddards" please and send the bill to us for reimbursement, thank you, I would rather have duplicate information than none at all.

We hope that you are well and that you feel that you are making good progress in this project.

GODDARD ROOTS

In Cheshire we have a family of Dones whose ancestors were the head foresters of Delamere forest who claim to trace their ancestry back to the Norman conquest and I feel that there may well be some Goddards who can do the same.

I like many others am struggling with the 17th century and when Brian and Julie lent me Rainald W K Goddards abstracts of Goddard wills starting at 1417 I realised how many Goddard families there were. My ancestors lived in the Romsey area of Hampshire and just to the west of it in the River Test area and for three generations the names Matthew, Timothy and Nicholas had cropped up so naturally I was hoping for a similar combination to occur again. The IGI showed a similar run of the name Nicholas at Sedgheill in Wiltshire in the early 17th century, and Matthew in the Marlborough area.

I felt that if I could index the 16th century wills for christian names and names of parishes I might at least see some trends showing up. I did this and then entered all bequests to churches or the poor into the parishes index and spotted that John of Poole in his will dated 1583 had made a bequest to the poor of Sedghill which indicated that he might well be a John who had apparently vanished from the Sedghill family tree, also he had a daughter Cecily and William of Sedghill referred to his niece Cecill in his will dated 1586 (GODDARD OF SEDGEHILL, CO. WILTS by R W K Goddard).

I have drawn up a table showing the interconnections between eighteen families of Wiltshire Goddards using the will abstracts and index which I think is self explanatory and I am hoping that some of you are going to write and say I have hit on their family, that it is right and append some more to it.

I sent it to Brian for vetting and almost by return I got a letter back giving database numbers of the majority of the testators and their beneficiaries- at least I was on the right track-but there is no information on.-

John-Will 1559-Urchfont	
John-Will 1564-Wynbourne] probably
Richard-Will 1572-Poole] related
John-Will 1555-Sedghill] probably
John-Will 1583-Poole]
John-Will 1588/9-Berwick St John] related

Going a little later, up to 1627, there is a will of Henry of Dynton whose father was Thomas of Burchenwood, Bramshaw. Henry refers to his brothers William of Milford and John, and his cousin William of Tollard Royal. Has anyone any information as to where Thomas emerges in the Goddard tree and cousin William? or any of the six Goddards listed above? Or could any be Huguenots? [Sean, Jan. 1993 Newsletter].

I am sure Brian and Julie will be most interested in any information you can let them have and doubtless they will pass it on to me.

Dear Brian & Julie,

I am sorry that I did not get round to seeing you while I was in Dorset and Hampshire but I had to cut short my visit at nine days as I was needed at home. I did not even get to Winchester R.O.

I have abstracted the following from the microfilm of the Romsey Parish register.

In 1822 Timothy is described as a labourer. In the 1841 & 1851 censuses he is a maltster. Charles is an apprentice printer in 1841; in 1851 he is a registrar and Emily Ann is a relieving officer; in 1858 he is described as Workhouse Master.

Another Goddard family in Romsey at that time was James and Eliza, he was a porter and they lived in Latimer St. I think I am right in saying he came from Guildford and she was from that area too.

I have not come across a Charles born in 1828 in Romsey although I might have missed him when I was going through the register. There was a Charles s/o William & Francis (Holley) 14.3.1819 East Wellow; also a Charles who married Anne Hood 9.8.1830 at East Wellow, they had a son Charles James 16.1.1831. An Isaac & Ann Goddard were also producing children at that time in Romsey, he was a miller: the only one I have listed is Mary 14.5.1826.

Dear Edward,

I thank you for your letters which arrived in the last week or so. I have enclosed the family trees, in draft, that will form the basis of the first chapter of the review of the N. Wilts Goddards to be published early next year, the first chapter that is.

I feel that these trees may go some way to helping you put the various branches into perspective and I will not go any further with your "Tentative Plan Of Wiltshire Goddards" until you have had chance to study it. As you can see there is no apparent link between the Wiltshire Goddards and those residing in the Sedgemoor, in the period when there is any likelihood of easily found documentary evidence in the way of Parish records or further wills, to give proof of a direct link. Unfortunately the names are so common of the period that little can be read into those. The interesting names come from the will of John of 1588, with Matthew, Raphe, Gabriel, Peter and Martin, most un-Goddardlike.

I have been able to add one or two new members of the Sedgemoor branch, from the pedigree tree that you sent, unfortunately it shows that this particular branch died out in the early 1700's.

I have marked up a copy of the sheets that you sent with numbers of those persons that I can identify from other sources to give you some help identifying them on the trees. I agree that the Poole and Sedgemoor families are very close, but there is still some work to be done here.

I think that is as far as I can go with the information as we have it at present, thank you again for the indexing. I hope that the enclosed will be of help in your quest, as you can see there is still along way to go.
