Henry 5.3.1828, Michael 17.4.1828. She has realised this and will doubtless check it out one-day.

## Searching for that extra generation

When I first started researching my Goddard ancestors all I knew of them was that my great grandparents were Henry Ellery and Sarah Goddard. Henry came from Romsey and they were married in Southampton. My father had Charles Goddard as his second and third Christian names and I soon came to realise the significance of this, in the 1841 census Henry and Sarah were living with Sarah's father Charles Goddard. Shortly after this I was introduced to the benefits of the IGI and found that Goddards had been living in the area surrounding the River Test just west of Romsey since the late 17th century and by putting families together there was an apparent succession of four generations starting with Matthew who was married to Dinah Lock in 1692, going to Nicholas who married Elizabeth Allen from Romsey, then a Matthew who married Martha Jones, and who had quite a large family including Charles who was born in 1790 and who married Phoebe Moody. There were other families but these were the ones which I was interested in. There were however two snags; there was no baptismal record of the first Matthew or of the Matthew who married Martha Jones.

At this stage I joined the Hampshire Genealogical Society and the Goddard Society and discovered that a member of the Hampshire Society, had researched this family and found a number of wills including those of the first Matthew, and Nicholas and Elizabeth Allen which proved a line of descent and in addition mentioned their son Matthew for whom I had not been able to find a baptism. I now had a clear line from Matthew's marriage in 1692 to Dinah Lock to the present day but I did not know his parents' names.

Brian and Julie our research co-ordinators suggested a Thomas Goddard who came to Bramshaw about two miles south of Wellow about 1620 might be the key to the mystery but were not very hopeful; he was a lawyer and did not seem to fit in with a farming family and I could not find any connection. I checked all the wills of Goddards in that vicinity and found that an Ann Goddard was Matthew's mother. As a last resort I sent for the will of a Thomas Goddard of Idmiston who died in 1654 (Idmiston was some fifteen miles away). It was a nuncupative will (made on his deathbed and unsigned) but it mentioned his widow Anne and his sister Sarah. Now a Thomas Goddard and his wife Anne had had a son Thomas baptised at Lockerley in 1651 and Matthew was supposed to have been born in 1652, were they Matthew's parents?

A search at Winchester Record Office found some notes about a Sarah Bust who married a Nicholas Hobart and after he died she married a Dr Matthew Barlow who was a descendant of William Barlow, Bishop of Chichester 1559-1568. This seemed very interesting because in Matthew Goddard's will he mentioned an aunt Sarah Barlow who had left a bequest for his son Nicholas. Were the two Sarah's one and the same?

Sarah's father was Matthew Bust who had been headmaster of Eton 1611-1630 and a search through the Eton papers at the Society of Genealogists revealed that his wife was a granddaughter of the former Bishop of Chichester. It now looked as though this might be the family connection I had been looking for. There was no record of Sarah having made a will but her mother and her husband both had and they were in the P.R.O. so I sent for copies, Nicholas Hobart made bequests to his sisters (in-law) Katherine Bust and Mrs Anne Goddard and Mrs Anne Bust left money to her grandsons Thomas, Alexander and Matthew Goddard so they were all children of her eldest daughter Anne and Thomas Goddard of Idmiston.

Is this the end of the search? Not really, although I have gone back another four generations on the Bust and Barlow lines it is only one in the Goddard line. I must still carry on!

I would like to acknowledge the assistance of Peter Morrall at Winchester Record Office and Rhoswen Charles at the Society of Genealogists in helping me trace these families.

Also I will that myn executours have all such manours landes and tenements which I have taken to ferme of John Burde gentilman and all the profites of the same towards the perfourmance of this my last wille And also to paye to the said John Burde forty pounds yerely according to suche indenture made between the said Burde and me the said Henry Barlee Also I will that myn executours paye to the Abbas of Barking my suster forty shillings and to Reynolde Whitbrede forty shillings for terme of their two lives eche of them according to the said indentures Also I will that my feoffees of and in my manor of Aldebury with thappurtenances do grant an Annuytie of sixtene pounds 13s4d to the said John Byrde for terme of his lyfe according to the said indenture Also I will that myn executours kepe Elizabeth Snowe my cosyn Isabell her sister and Dorothe Snowe her suster all thinges necessarye until they be maried Also I will and geve unto James Fitzwarren my trusty and wellbeloved servant forty shillinges terme of his life that is to say my house and landes in Stonden late Arssemas whiche I purchased lately which is worth by yere 26s8d. And thother 13s4d I will that my feoffees of and in the manor of Cochamsted by their sufficient dede grante out of the said manor with a clause of distresse for noon payment And if the said James mary and take to wyfe Cristian Steward somtyme my servant then I will she shall have the said landes & Annuytie

Dear Brian and Julie,

This is a very factual account of these Goddards. I will leave it to you to put a bit of flesh on the bones. To the best of my knowledge all the facts are right but I have not checked everything that I have received. Henry Goddard who became landlord of the Red Rover is definitely a member of the family. His birth date is 1823 not 1828 as Anne Offor had got it.

### DESCENDANTS OF THOMAS GODDARD AND MARGARET BURLEY OF STANDEN HUSSEY

Thomas (01104) was married twice; the first wife was Dorothy Stevens (01105) who died and was buried at Hungerford on 08/01/1589. This was apparently following complications on the birth of their first child Dorothy (01174) who was baptised at Hungerford on the 25/11/1589. Subsequently he married Margaret (01106), the daughter of George Burley of Potterne. Thomas died March 1509/10 and was buried at Hungerford on 24/03/1610. In his will he mentions only five children, Dorothy, Anna, Francis, Edward and Alexander, their other children, John, Thomas and Elizabeth are not in the will. By his will Anne, Alexander and Edward received 1000 marks each and "my eldest son Francis Goddard to be paid out of lands by me bargained and sold to Sir Alexander Tutt, Knight, and Richard Goddard Esq." It is interesting to note that the wife of Sir Alexander Tutt was Millicent Burley the sister of Margaret and that the name Alexander was perpetuated in the Goddard Thomas' son Alexander (01170) married Jane the daughter of William Hore of Ham in 1622 and lived at Shipton Bellinger. *PARISH REG IN WINCHESTER* The parish register is almost illegible but they seem to have had three children, Thomas, Jane born 20/04/1632 at Ham just south of Hungerford<sup>1</sup> and Alexander born 1637. He did not leave a will but his accounts indicate that he left £61. Jane his widow who died in 1673 left rings worth a noble to her brother William, her daughter-in-law Anne Goddard and her children and to her other grandchild Robert Foyle.

Her son Alexander was left the residue of the estate. This might seem to be a rather inequitable distribution but Anne was probably wealthier than her mother-in-law, her father had been headmaster of Eton college and her maternal grandfather William Barlow wrote the first book about magnetism in the English language. An Alexander Goddard of Broomy Lodge died in 1696 leaving £84-11-6 according to his inventory. He is probably the son of Alexander and Jane.

Thomas married Anne daughter of Mathew Bust probably during the Civil War period. They seem to have lived at Edmiston and their children were Alexander, Thomas and Mathew. Thomas was baptised at Lockerly in 1650 and the event is recorded in the Shipton Bellinger register. Thomas senior died intestate in 1654 and "Letters of Administration for Mrs Anne Goddard of Edmiston in the County of Wilts. widow of Thomas Goddard gent decd. Directed to Barnabas Barlow of Lockerley and Gilbert Coles of the same, clerke", together with his inventory seem to be the only record of his death. Barnabas Barlow was the uncle of his widow Anne. Anne died in 1701/2 at West Wellow near her son Mathew; after being a widow for 48 years she left £78-13-1 and there was no social security then!

Two more names appear in the family at this time, Mathew which lasts for four generations was the name of his great grandfather, grandfather and uncle, all Mathew Busts; the other name is Nicholas, this was the name of Anne's brother-in-law Nicholas Hobart and his son who died young. Alexander had three children all baptised at Wellow, Sarah 1682, Alexander 1685 and Catherine 1691. Mathew (ca. 1652-1733) married Dinah Lock in 1692, they had six children, all baptised at Wellow - Sarah (1693-) married Thomas Bugden of New Sarum Dinah (1696-) married Thomas Leach of Wallop 1719, Mathew (1697-1698/9), Timothy (1700/1-1740/1), Mathew (1703/1733). Nicholas (1708-1766) Mathew's Inventory

amounted to £246. He left his lands called Long Janes, Little Janes and Greys all in West Wellow to his son Timothy but jointured with his wife Dinah; Dinah to have the house and household goods and stock for life, then to revert to Timothy. If Timothy has no heirs then it is to go to Nicholas on Timothy's death. Nicholas gets two silver spoons and a feather bed and Timothy gets one silver spoon. Timothy also has to pay Nicholas £250, this includes legacies left him by his uncle Eliakim Lock and great-aunt Mrs Sarah Barlow. [Sarah Bust married first Nicholas Hobart then her cousin Dr Mathew Barlow]. His daughter's children all had £5. Nicholas (1708-1766) married Elizabeth Allen of Romsey (1717-1772). Their children were-Nicholas (1742-1827), Elizabeth (1744-1777), Timothy (1747-), Thomas (1756-), Dinah Mathew (-1808) married Martha Jones (1756-1817) of Romsey. Mary married William Petty. In his will Nicholas left Jeanes, Great Jeanes, Little Jeanes, Grays and Prowers, a moiety in 'The Sign of The Cross Keys' at Romsey and the 'Bowling Green', all live and dead stock, household goods and personal estate and freedom to cut timber to pay legacies, in trust to his wife, Thomas Hooper of Ower, Richard Figes of Romsey his kinsmen to support his widow in bringing up younger children. After the death of Elizabeth to support trustees for same until the youngest reaches 21. Then Timothy gets £60, Elizabeth gets £100, Thomas receives a moiety in Cross Keys and Bowling Green. The residue to be divided between Mathew, Dinah and Mary.

In the will of Elizabeth (Allen) Goddard she leaves her moiety in the Cross Keys in trust to be sold and out of the proceeds Dinah to have £20, Mathew £10 and Thomas £60 together with the residue after expenses. Daughter Elizabeth receives a leasehold messuage which her mother bought of the representatives of John Petty decd. and daughter Mary receives a leasehold house and lands called Butlers. Household goods go to Elizabeth and

Dinah; rings and clothes to the three daughters, and the remainder to be equally divided amongst all the children.

Nicholas (1742-1827) married Ruth Schackel (1757-1820), he is not mentioned in the will of either his father or mother, so presumably he has been set up at Chapmans Farm previously. They had nine children - Timothy (1777-1832), Thomas (1779-1857), William (1781-1841), Elizabeth (1784-), James (1788-1807), Dinah (1788-1802), Nicholas (1791-1879), Mary (1793-1864), Sarah Ruth (1795-1830). In his will Nicholas (1742-1827) left Chapmans Farm except for "New Orchard" etc. to his son Timothy on condition that he pays his six brothers and sisters £150 each. Son Nicholas receives three tenements including New Orchard. His three daughters the money from the sale of a freehold messuage; and Timothy receives any residue. Timothy (1777-1832) left Chapmans Farm to his brother Thomas for a security of £1100 to pay his brothers and sisters and children. The brothers and sisters would get interest and after their deaths the money would go to the children. He also left property to his brother William, sisters Elizabeth Lovell and Mary, and brother-in-law John Petty. Thomas (1779-) married Elizabeth Holley in 1801. Their children were Sarah (1801-), James (1804-), William (1806-1873), Charles (1809-1884), Nicholas (1809-1875), Mary Ann (1813-1872), James (1804-) married Jane ? and went to live in Southampton in a house belonging to his father. William (1806-1873) married Hannah Hill in 1858. He inherited Chapmans Farm. Their children were Elizabeth (1858-1911) married James Biddlecombe Martin in 1893, Mary (1860-), William (1862-) described as a farmer/dairyman married Ethel Alice Hutchings in 1894. She was a barmaid at the Red Rover. Charles (1809-1884) married Anne Hood in 1830. He was a carpenter as was their son Charles James (1831-1913) who married Mary ? from Plaitford. They had five children - George (1856-1857), Emily Frances (1857-) who married James Robert Staveley. Thomas (1860-),

Returning to William (1781-1841), son of Nicholas and Ruth Schackel, he is described as an Innkeeper. He married Frances Holley in 1818 and was living at ???Eling???? when he died. Frances afterwards went to live in London at Cromer St, St. Pancras. Their children were - Elizabeth & Charles (1818-), Patience (1820-), Timothy (1821-), Henry (1823-), became landlord of the Red Rover at Wellow. George (1826-), Michael (1828-), Edward (1831-), Rosa Ruth (1832-1833), William (1834-), Fanny (1838-).

Henry married Ann Baker nee Abbot from Debenham, their children were - William John (1860-1864) at Wellow, Frank Edward (1860-) at Wellow, Charles Hedley at Richmond, Frederick A (1862-) at Richmond, Fanny (1866-) at Richmond, Emily Kate (1869-) at Richmond, John Seymour (1867-), William (1869-) at Southampton, Alfred Ernest (1873-) at Wellow, described as a wine cellar man. Michael (1828-) married Sarah Buchan at Holy Trinity Church, Brompton in 1849. Her father's name was given as James Bucking (deceased). They had two sons William George born 1851 at Cromer St. and Alfred George born 1860 at Judd St. Grays Inn Lane. William G. married Eliza Harriet Tottman and Alfred G. married Kate Charlotte Rogers.

Again going back to Nicholas and Ruth Schackel their son Mathew who died in 1808 married Martha Jones (1756-1817) of Romsey. He did not leave a will but his letters of administration indicated that he left less than £800. they had six children - Timothy (1781-) baptised at Wellow, Mathew (1782-) baptised at Wellow, Elizabeth (1785-) baptised at Wellow, Martha (1787-) baptised at Mottisfont, Charles (1790-) baptised at Mottisfont,

Thomas (1794-) baptised at Mottisfont. Timothy married Catherine ?, in the 1851 census he is a maltster. They had two children Charles (1822-), and Martha. Charles was first an apprentice printer, then the Registrar at Romsey and finally with his wife Emily Ann (Henbest)? workhouse master at Romsey. They had six or seven children- Frederick (1848-) probably went to America. Charles Edward (1851-) became a solicitors clerk at Southampton 1881, Louisa Emily (1853-), Arthur C.(1856-). I have not found any trace of his baptism. He appears in the 1881 census-bank clerk-Andover. Harry Henbest (1857-) was a clerk to an ironmonger at Aldershot 1881, Ada Anna (1858-), Frank (1860-) probably went to America. The Henbests came from Bramshaw, in 1891 Harry Henbest Goddard was a builders clerk and in 1896 he built a house at Hoddesden called Bramshaw which is still in use by the family. He was married and had a son Nelson Charles Goddard. Charles (1790-) married Phoebe Moody at Sherfield English in 1812. They had a daughter Sarah (ca.1820-1884) who married Henry Ellery in 1839. They had two children Henry Frookes 1840 and Sarah Ann 1846. Charles, Phoebe and Sarah all give Lockerley as their birthplace in the 1851 census. Henry Ellery was a painting contractor, his son Henry Frookes was a painter and builder. family for at least the four generations.
