Dear Brian and Julie,

I have been a member for a number of years and find the Newsletter interesting but have not yet seen anything that comes anywhere near my Goddard Connections. I am therefore writing to you to see if your databases have anything to connect with my branch.

My maternal grandmother was Alice Kathleen Goddard, born 28th August 1889 at 449, Strand in central London, daughter of James Jackson Goddard and Alice Mary (nee Mason). James Jackson Goddard and Alice Mary Mason were married on 5th Jan. 1886 at Wimbledon Parish Church in Surrey. James' age is given as 34 yrs making his birth c.1852. His father is given as James Goddard, Hairdresser.

Can you give any info. perhaps from 1881 or 1891 Census records to indicate where James Jackson might have been born and also maybe his father James? I appreciate James could be a common first name but if the second name is recorded it would be quite specific. The approx. birthdate of 1852 could narrow the field also. I maintain a database on my AYTON name and having the full listing for the 1881 census is very useful in finding anyone around that time. Even so some are missing due to spelling and transcription errors.

Information from family stories indicate that James Jackson may have come from Enniskillen in N.Ireland but I am not sure if he was born there himself or if his family originated from there. The IGI lists an Arthur Charles and a Betsy born in 1864 and 1867 respectively in Enniskillen, children of James Goddard and Elizabeth Gamble. If James Jackson was born in Enniskillen, he might have been an older brother from this family. Do you have anyone else researching in this area?

Other family info gives the following brothers of James Jackson, Henry (older) and Ernest (younger). Alice Kathleen had two sisters and three brothers namely Florence Sophia, Maisie, William, Henry Jackson (1894-1974) and Arthur Cecil Patrick. If you have any dates for these other than Henry Jackson, I would be very grateful.

I enclose photocopies of the certificates from which the above details are taken for your collection. I have checked my Ayton files but have no other Goddard connections.

I look forward to hearing from you hopefully with some pointers towards my future researches.

Dear Chris,

I wish I could write that "what a pity you waited so long to ask us - we can supply your family tree going back to 1537...". Sometimes we can write this, but I am afraid that in your case we cannot help much.

I have looked through the Goddards in the 1881 census of Surrey but the only Goddards who were in Wimbledon were the family of **Sarah Goddard**, aged 46, widow, annuitant, and her three children. Sarah was born in Finsbury. The reference number is 0831 7 9 1341196. She could have been related to your **James Jackson Goddard** and the reason he was in Wimbledon and met Alice Mary Mason - or there could be no connection at all.

I have looked through the 1881 census of Middlesex, Surrey and Kent for hairdressers but had no success in that direction either. Father James Goddard could have remained in Ireland anyway.

Have you looked at the 1881 census of who was living at both addresses given on the marriage certificate? If you do not know where to get printouts please let me know and I will see what I can do.

I have also been through our London/ Middlesex/ Surrey file of outstanding queries and found nothing which is anything like your tree. We have not yet been able to get any copies of the Goddards in the 1891 census, and have only a few county indexes for the 1851 census.

We have virtually nothing on the Irish Goddards either, but I did review a very useful looking book on Irish records a few months ago. It was "Irish Records: sources for Family historians" by James G. Ryan. ISBN 0 916489 76 0. As it is priced at £30 you might like to enquire if it is in your local library rather than buy it yourself. Ask if the library can borrow it for you if they do not stock it themselves.

You might also like to write a bit about your family for the Goddard Newsletter and send it to Richard, the editor, at the address given on the back page. Sometimes other members can help with extra information.

Dear Mrs Goodship-Patience,

I have just been looking through some of our old correspondence files to see if we have any more information to hand which could solve old problems. I have found your original letter of September 1995. If it is not too late, I can tell you more about your great grandfather from the 1881 census.

William Goddard was aged 25, married head of the household and working as a cook. He lived in London, St Marylebone and was born in Hammersmith.

Helen Goddard (not Ellen) was 24 wife of William, no occupation, born in St Marylebone. Their daughter was named Lavinia C. Goddard and she was 7 months old when the census was taken on 3/4 April 1881. Her birth certificate should be available in the Dec 1880 or Jan 1881 quarters of the Public Record Office - or Family Record Centre as I believe it is called now. I could get this for you if you like - cost £9.50 last time I got one. The reference number for the house was 0155 121 45 1341034 if you want to get the original schedules - or I can do it for you, no cost.

I hope this may have been some help to you.

My grandmother's maiden name was Goddard and I have been
trying to research our family tree.

My great-grandfather, William Goddard was born about
1855. He married Ellen Wiseman on 3/8/1879. His father
was also named William Goddard and was working as a
collector.

My great-grandfather worked as a carver/chef in London.
He had seven children, my grandmother, Madeline Violet
was the youngest. He died on 5/1/1907 aged 51.

Three of the sons, William Thomas, Sydney and Roland
(possibly Henry Roland) emigrated to Australia. Roland
returned during the First World War and did not go back.

If any of my research would be of any use to you, I would
be very happy to send you any information I have.

Unfortunately, due to cash restraints, I have not been
able to find out where the family came from before they
came to London. I would be grateful if you have any
information which may be of use to me.

Thank you for your letter about your Goddard ancestors.

I have looked in the few records which we have for London but cannot identify your **William Goddard**. You will appreciate that Goddard is not an uncommon name, and most Victorian families had a son named William.

Have you found the family in the 1881 census? The entry for **William** the collector should tell you where he thought he was born. We are awaiting copies of the index entries of the London area to arrive. as it will be the largest county it will be one of the last to appear, but should be due in the next few months. The original is of course available for consultation in London. If you can find that your Goddards came into London fom the country we can probably help you further.

I enclose a leaflet about our association. We do have a "Can you help?" column in our newsletter where members can advertise to see if other members can assist.

Dear Ms Goddard

Thank you for your letter dated 25th April.

Since my first letter to you in 1995 I have managed to find out a little more about my Goddard connections.

The 1881 census shows William Goddard, age 25 working as a cook, born in Hammersmith and his wife Helen. William's daughter Lavinia and his brother Frank were also resident at the same address. However there are several errors. William's wife was Ellen, not Helen. Although William place of birth was given as Hammersmith, he was actually born in Mile End. Maybe he thought that Hammersmith sounded posher!

I have enclosed a copy of some of my notes so far. I have also enclosed copies of the following certificates:-

- Death Certificate for William Thomas Goddard 5 Jan 1907
- Birth Certificate for William Thomas Goddard 15 Jul 1882
- Marriage Certificate for William Goddard and Ellen Wiseman 3 Aug 1879
- Birth Certificate for William Goddard 2 Oct 1855

Although I found the family in the 1881 census, I have yet to find any of "my" Goddards in any of the other census. If you have any information or indexes which may help me I would be extremely grateful.

I would like to say that I am very grateful that there are people such as yourself who are prepared to give up their time to help others. The Goddard Association newsletter is very informative and interesting, even when none of the Goddards mentioned are related to you.

1.1.5. William Thomas GODDARD

William was born in London 15 JUL 1882. William traveled in To Sea, ABT 1896. He moved ABT 1905 in West Australia. He married Ettie in Gingin, West Australia, 15 JUN 1907. At 32 years of age William became the father of George GODDARD in Perth, Western Australia, 19 DEC 1914. Notes from a letter from Uncle George, only son of William Thomas.

"My father left London about 1896 at the age of fourteen. He went to sea and spent seven years or so as a seaman. I gather he spent most of his time at sea in ships of the Shire Line e.g. Shropshire, Fifeshire, Ayreshire, etc. The Shire Line sailed mainly between London, Australia, New Zealand and Argentina and were engaged in carrying frozen meat to England. After about seven years at sea he settled in Western Australia where he settled.

For the first few years he worked in the farming districts as a general farm hand and teamster (driving teams of horses). During this time he met my mother and they were married at Gingin, a small county town about 50 miles from Perth. Gingin was my mother's home town, her parents being the original whites in the area.

After their marriage, they spent some time in the country districts before moving to Perth and Fremantle where Dad worked as a stoneman.

About 1922 we moved to Busselton, a farming town about 150 miles north of Perth, where a community farm was being established. About 1926 we moved back to Perth where Dad took on a variety of jobs before he established a poultry farm at Jesnells, about 12 miles from Perth. He continued poultry farming for most of the remainder of his working life. When re retired he moved closer to Perth."

1.1.6. Sydney GODDARD

Sydney became the father of Tess GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Nell GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Bill GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Gwen GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Len GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Edie GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Judy GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney became the father of Roland GODDARD in Western Australia. Sydney was born EST 1885. He married CIS ABT 1920. Sydney became the father of Sydney GODDARD in London, ABT 1922.

1.1.7. Henry Roland GODDARD

Rol was born ABT 1889. He emigrated, ABT 1910. Point of origin: pt of origin unknown. Rol served in the military in Australian Army, ABT 1914 to 1918. He married Isabel Lizzie COOPER in London, 31 OCT 1916. At 29 years of age Rol became the father of Louis GODDARD in Paddington, Middlesex, 01 JUN 1919. Rol was granted a divorce from ^{Lizzie Cooper} an unknown person 26 APR 1926. He married Adolphine in France, ABT 1928. He married Betty in France, ABT 1950. Rol died ABT 1970 in Amiens, France. Emigrated to Western Australia with his brothers, William and Sydney. Came back to Europe during WW1. Was at Gallopoli.

Ran a hotel in France until WW2. Ran Salvation Army canteens during the war, including one at Kings Cross Station and through France and Belguim as the allies advanced.

Went back to Amiens, France after the war. Ran a hotel called the Anzac (after the Australian army) and took Australian visitors to see the battlefields. Also owned a florist shop.

1.1.8. Madeline Violet GODDARD

Madeline was born in Fulham, Middlesex 24 FEB 1899. She married Percy Alfred BULLARD in

Hammersmith, London, 16 APR 1927. Madeline became the mother of Jean BULLARD ABT 1930. At 32 years of age Madeline became the mother of Robert Charles BULLARD in Queen Charlotte's Hospital, London, 9 FEB 1932. Madeline became the mother of Peter BULLARD ABT 1934. Madeline died 18 AUG 1974 in Hounslow, Middlesex, at 75 years of age.

1.2. Henry Thomas GODDARD

He was baptized in Whitechapel, Stepney, London, 6 MAR 1859. Religion: religion unknown. Henry was born MAR 1859.

1.3. Frank GODDARD

Frank was born in Bethnel Green, Middlesex ABT 1861. He was baptized in Whitechapel, Stepney, London, 08 APR 1866. Religion: religion unknown. He was listed as head of household in the 1881 census in Marylebone, Middlesex. *brother of*
