Re:- Goddard Association

I write in response to your entry in the January issue of Family Tree Magazine and would be grateful if you could provide me with details of the Goddard Association and if possible any links with my family.

I have previously carried out research into my great uncle's family tracing it back to 1657. This was relatively easy as the family have only moved 3 miles in 300 years! I also produced a booklet for his 80th birthday containing family memoir's, details about the area they lived and pictures of family members. This is something I would like to do for my own family.

I have only just started research into my family and enclose the brief details that I have collected so far. My great great grand-father, John Edwin Goddard (born about 1849) lived at Heatherview, Collingwood, Camberley in about 1900. I have a picture of my great grandfathers wedding in 1910 with the family, including John Edwin Goddard standing outside this house.

Last week I visited Camberley library, the above mentioned house and Guildford library (looking at the 1891 and 1881 census) to familiarise myself with the area and to get a local view of what I am researching. I wanted to do this before contacting you in order that I could provide a bit more information but I'm afraid my efforts didn't reveal very much, just a few items about land ownership in 1800.

I hope this information is useful and look forward to receiving details of the Goddard Association.

Dear Mrs Dart,

Thank you for your letter about your Goddard ancestors.

I am afraid that the details you give of John Edwin Goddard, born about 1849, are too vague for us to trace him and so far no member has yet sent in a tree which has John Edwin Goddard on it. Goddard is quite a common name as you probably found, and John Goddard (many records only give the first name) is one of the commonest combinations.

If you did not find John Edwin G. in the 1881 and 1891 censuses of Surrey perhaps he was living somewhere else. If you do discover that he moved to Surrey from another place do try our records again, as for some places we have comprehensive records.

We have had a very good response to the advertisement in "Family Tree Magazine" and I am proposing to list all the queries which we have received in the next issue of our Newsletter, which should be published in April or May. If anyone writes in with any more information I will let you know.

I have checked through my file of Surrey Goddards and unfortunately for you find that no one with a similar Goddard ancestry has yet been in touch. Lots of other Goddards from that area, but not from Farnham and not builders. I checked your family in the 1881 census of Surrey and I take it that you have done the same, otherwise I can send you the list.

My husband, Brian has written a monograph about the Goddards of North East Hampshire, covering Yateley, Frimley and Cove in which he explains the difficulties of identifying the Goddards from around there and over the border into Surrey. You might like to buy a copy and see for yourself just how many Goddard families there are in the area. The monographs can be bought from Richard Goddard at the address at the end of the Newsletter (if you haven't yet got one, there is one due in July) price £3 (postage included).

It would also be a good idea to write a short account of your family for the Newsletter. Say how long they have been in Farnham and that they were all builders or bricklayers. There is no need to type it, but clear handwriting would help Richard with his editing.

Both the offices of Sheriff and Alderman date back to the Middle Ages and reflect their long-standing importance in the government of the City of London.

The office of Sheriff is of greater antiquity than any other in the City of London. Until the institution of the Mayoralty in 1189, Sheriffs or 'Shire Reeves' governed the City as the King's representatives, collected royal revenues and enforced royal justice.

Today two Sheriffs are elected on Midsummer's Day every year in Guildhall by the [City livery companies](#). Their duties include attending the [Lord Mayor](#) in carrying out his official duties, attending the sessions at the Central Criminal Court in the Old Bailey and presenting petitions from the City to Parliament at the Bar at the House of Commons.

Since 1385 when the Court of Common Council stipulated that every future Lord Mayor should previously have been Sheriff so that he may be tried as to his governance and bounty before he is elected Mayor, the shrieval year of an Aldermanic Sheriff is a sort of testing-ground for a candidate who aspires one day to be elected Lord Mayor of London.

This year's Sheriffs are Alderman Nick Anstee and Geoffrey Bond.

References to aldermen or 'elder men' can be traced back to Saxon times, but the first named alderman of London by name appears in 1111. The Court of Aldermen administered the evolution of the Court of Common Council but its functions contracted as those of Common Council developed. Today the full Aldermanic Court, summoned and presided over by the Lord Mayor about nine Tuesdays in the year in the Aldermen's Court Room in [Guildhall](#). At Court of Aldermen wear violet gowns. Fur-trimmed scarlet gowns and chains of office are worn on occasions.

Aldermen have jurisdiction over their wards and for centuries the 25 [wards](#) of the City have had an alderman. Upon admission to the Court of Aldermen, an alderman automatically becomes a Justice of the Peace for the City of London. They also serve on Common Council committees, act as governors of a variety of schools, hospitals, charitable foundations and trusts with ancient City trusts. They are also occupied with [livery companies](#), ceremonial events and [Freedoms of the City](#).
