Dear Mrs Cadzow,

As you are so far away I had a researcher check the 1851 census of Bath to see if your Goddard family could be traced there - though your genealogical records in Australia are reported to be far more complete and readily available than here.

The researcher reports that there was only one **George Goddard** in and around Bath at this time.

The reference is

Albert Terrace is said to be in a suburb of Bath called Lyncombe and Widcombe and the folio number starts at 226, reference LW 01J 17 - which numbers only make sense when you actually see the schedules!

There were apparently several other Goddard references in this area, but this was the only George Goddard.

You might like to employ this researcher -actually man and wife, Brian and Ruth Pettey, 10 Summerlands Park Avenue, Ilminster, Somerset TA19 9BS to look for your George junior, who would have been born in 1857/8. They charge £3.50 an hour which is very reasonable.

There are no other members that I am aware of searching for Goddards of Bath and Paddington/Kensington areas, but I will sent Richard, who writes the Newsletter, a note so that he can put a plea in the "Can you help?" column of some future issue.

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Dear Mrs. Goddard,

Thank you for your letter and cheque of the 10th August, as a result of which we were able to undertake your instructions at our Taunton RO today. The city of Bath was a very large area even in those days but quite fortunately there are indexes for the 1851 census otherwise it would have taken many hours to research.

These indexes are in printed book form and there are about a dozen of them which cover the main city area of Bath St. James, St. Michael's, Bath Abbey, Walcot parishes forming the main city plus the outlying areas such as Twerton, Bathwick, Lyncombe & Widcombe to name but some of them. First of all each book has to be studied to locate the particular surname required, then hopefully the christian names, their ages and reference numbers. These numbers are then cross-referenced in another book which will give you the details of which microfiche is required and what folio number you have to start from and work through until the entry is found. So it is not too straightforward in practice and can still take a time to do.

All of the indexes were searched and just one entry found for an adult George GODDARD; this was referenced as LW 01J 17 which cross-referenced placed it as being at Lyncombe & Widcombe (just outside the city) and the folio number to start at was 226. The entry was found:

**Folio 237, page 17. Schedule 88, Albert Terrace.**

This was the only adult George GODDARD in or near Bath on this census and was not a stone cutter as you suggested. We hope this is the right one for your sake but obviously we cannot tell as you gave no further information. This wife's birthplace was spelt this way but in our opinion it could have been Mudford, a small parish below Yeovil in Somerset and in turn not far from the border with Dorset.

Sorry if this is not the entry you were hoping for but this was all that could be found, though there was other GODDARD entries around.

It is time for me to write to you again regarding my elusive Goddard family. I have the marriage certificate of my grandparents as follows:

Trinity Church, Paddington MDX

11 October 1880. George GODDARD 23 years, bachelor, decorator, 103 Cirencester Street. Father: George GODDARD (deceased), stonecutter.

Lucy Alice BUSBY, 21 years, 103 Cirencester Street. Father: Joseph BUSBY (deceased), cabproprietor.

Witnesses: Albert GODDARD      Anne HEADY.

I found Albert GODDARD at the above address in the 1881 census, and his place of birth is stated as Bath, Somerset. I have a print out of the Goddards in Somerset from the 1881 census film, and it seems to point to the possibility that my family came from that area. This has been re-inforced in my mind as the groom's father was a stonecutter, and I understand that beautiful stone was cut in the Bath area.

Are there other members of our Association researching the Bath Goddards, and also the Paddington/Kensington Goddards from 1850+? I would be very keen to contact them.



Dear Julie

Thank you for your air-letter of 18 June acknowledging receipt of the Bank Draft/cheque for information forwarded on FWKs.

As requested herewith a copy of the Hampson tree showing the solitary Goddard link. As indicated previously, due to pressure of work I've not had sufficient time to explore several of these links and as a consequence have no further progress to report on them - the original submission to the Association being based on the comment that every little piece helps complete the larger jigsaw.

In response to your question - no I don't belong to the Notts FHS. However, I have already written to them (25 June in fact) asking if it is possible to place an enquiry in their Journal. I'll follow up on the Archives after receiving a response from the FHS.

Thank you for the background about your family and their connection to FWK. Yes, I agree, many were trapped in 'hell hole' from which they couldn't escape - there was little if any alternatives to pursue. Those that did succeed in breaking the mould no doubt did somewhat better for themselves (relatively speaking). The promise of new opportunity in America must have been very attractive and obviously far-outweighed the associated dangers and hardships. Compared to FWK, I presume anything else could only have been better.

Just by the by, I now have three links to Charlemagne and even further back to Childeric I and Clovis (all substantiated) via the Bullen, Warren and Denne (Gookin) lines. According to the book 'Bloodline of the Holy Grail' by Laurence Gardner (Element Books 1996) p236/7, the author also shows a link between Childeric and Clovis, and Jesus and his brother - so yes, we have an indirect link this far back as well. Although the author quotes several sources and justifies his reasoning, I am totally ignorant of the history of this period and furthermore totally unqualified to assess the merit or value of the references cited. So on balance until it has passed the acid test of 'trial by fire' amongst the relevant authorities (it's easier to criticize), I must assume that certain aspects are dubious and questionable. Nevertheless it has had an impact on me - statistically I knew there must be a link somehow but to see it in print and to think that in a very complex way we may be related - that's quite something for me.

Winter has hit hard these last several days. Gale force to hurricane force winds up to 140 km/hr and sea swells up to 9.5 m have wreaked considerable havoc along our west coast with many houses being totally undermined by the action of the waves. On top of it all, it's jolly cold (for us that is) with today's max day temperature hitting 13 deg C without the chill factor being taken into account. Snow is expected on the mountains around us (about 20 miles distant). It's also been raining cats and dogs (and a few other things besides). 90% rain is forecast for today as well. With the high winds behind the rain, water is finding it's

way through every little nook and cranny. Yesterday it even started coming through the airvent - the brick wall is two bricks thick!!



**Re: Goddard Association of Europe – Membership No 23002**

I have just joined the Association and in my joining letter, the Membership Secretary suggested I send a copy of my family tree to you.

Please find enclosed my tree as far as I know it at the moment. As you will see, my great great grandfather was George Goddard, born in 1832/3. He and his brothers and sisters lived in Holton in Somerset, where their father Nathaniel was the blacksmith. Nathaniel was, according to the census returns for 1841-1871, born in Bourton in Dorset. However, in searching for his birth in the Bourton parish registers, I actually only found the baptisms of his two eldest sons, George and William! Nathaniel died somewhere between 1871 and 1881 as his wife, Ann, is a widow on the 1881 census.

Nathaniel's son George left the family home some time between 1851, when he appears on the Holton census, and 1861 when he appears with his wife Sarah and three eldest children in Freemantle in the parish of Millbrook, Southampton. They then stayed in the Millbrook and Shirley areas of Southampton for the 1871 and 1881 censuses. By the time of the 1891 census, Sarah was a widow living with her two youngest children, including Emma (my great grandmother).

As you can see, I don't have a great deal of information about any of the other descendants of Nathaniel. His father was a John Goddard and, according to the register of Nathaniel's marriage to Ann Corp, he was a parish clerk but I don't know where.

I haven't done any Goddard research for some years now as I've got distracted by starting on the Winteridges! However, I am now spurred back into Goddard action so will be pleased to hear if you have any other members researching the same line.

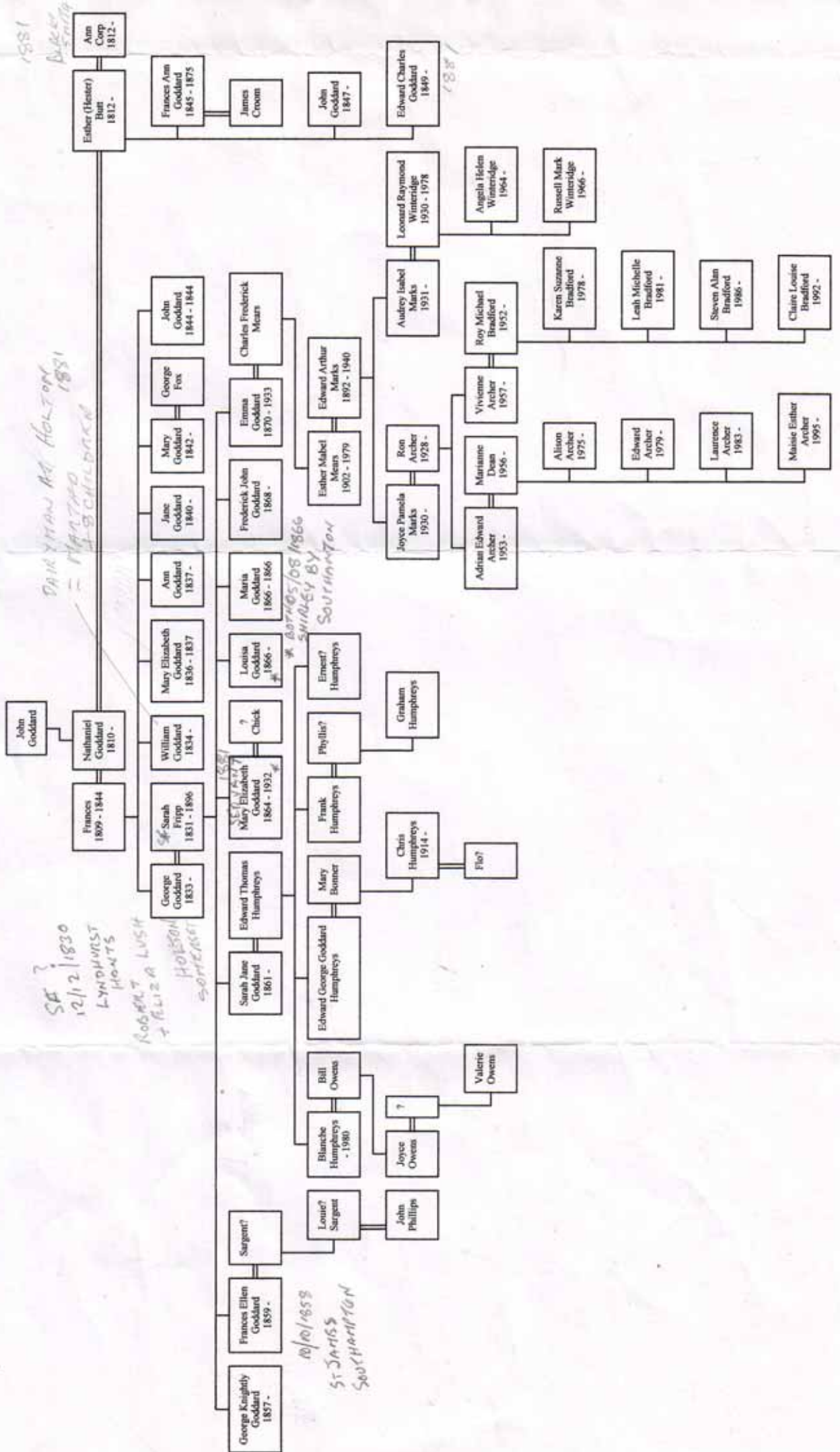

thank you for your letter and the tree, it is not a tree that we have any one else researching. However, we will pass your information to Jim Goddard in Exeter who researches Somerset and Devon Goddards in general.

I did some quick checking with the computer looking at the G.G.G. and one or two other areas but did not come up with very much more than you have, but for what it is worth here it is:

1/ Sarah Fripp d/o Robert & Eliza (nee Lush) baptised 12/12/1830 at Lyndhurst Hants.

2/ Frances Ellen Goddard baptised 10/10/1858 St James Southampton.

3/ Mary Elizabeth and Louisa Goddard were baptised on the same day 05/08/1866 at Shirley by Southampton.

4/ William born 1834, was a dairyman, married to Martha with 8 children at Holton in 1881.

5/ Ann Goddard (nee Corp) and son in law Edward Charles Goddard were still in Holton in 1881 were she is still the blacksmith, at 69!

That is all we have so far, but if you could give me some dates and places of births/baptism, marriages and deaths/burials, for those Goddards you have the details for, I will put them on to the computer. This may help someone else in the future.

I am most intrigued with the drawing of the tree how did you do it? I have been looking for a computer programme to generate trees with the sort of variation you have used on your tree for ages. I cheat I get the computer to print out the details as labels then I stick them down on blank paper and have then to draw the lines by hand, so almost any thing would be an improvement on that.

Thank you again for your letter, I'll pass a copy on to Jim, but don't hold your breath waiting for a reply he is a very busy man, but may be able to help with the Somerset connections when he has a moment.
