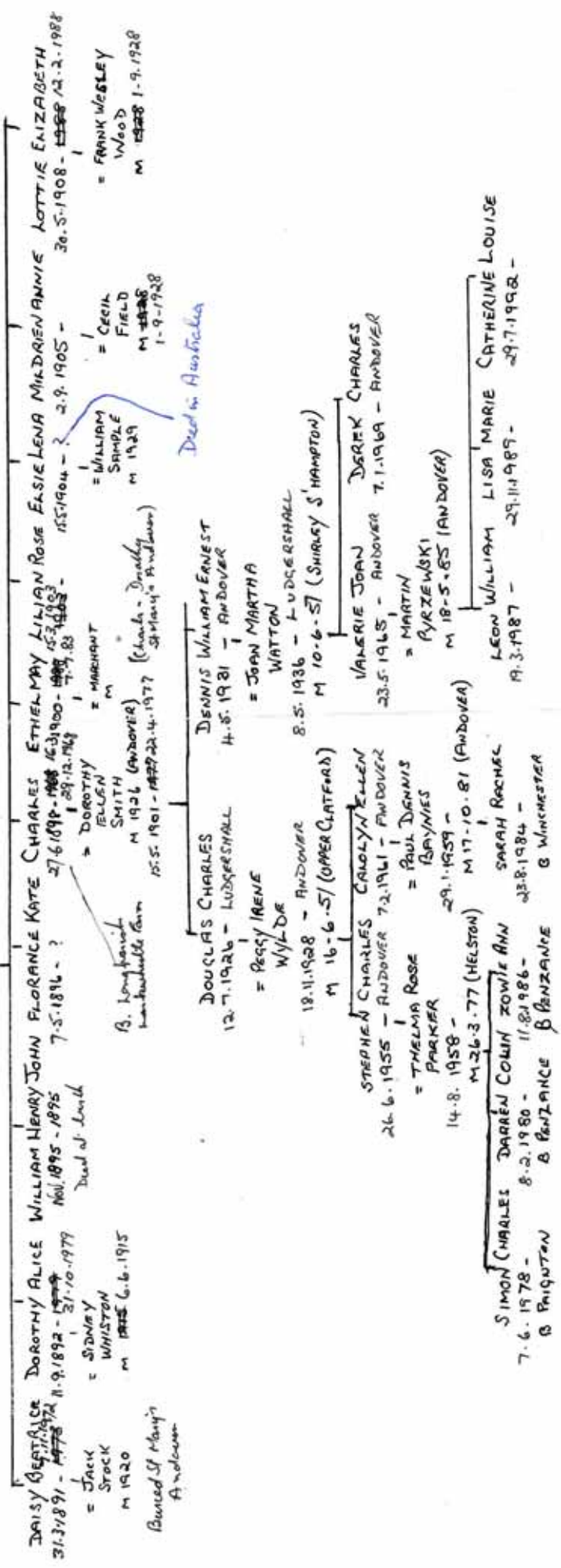

Dear Mrs. Goddard,

Thank you so much for your prompt reply and for the map and drop-line chart and the William Corbett account of his journey through Pewsey. I shall enclose a money order for your expenses.

I have a copy of the Balance sheet for the Estate of William Goddard (1875). I shall enclose a copy and see if it is of any value to you. Very likely he was a tenant farmer.

You are correct in assuming that William and Caroline were living in London well before 1871. Their second child, Elizabeth, my great grandmother, was born 11 June 1847 at Hoop and Grapes, Broadway. Her father, William, describes himself as 'groom'. Elizabeth was baptized at St. Margaret's, as were several of the other children. I have not yet accessed the parish records, but it is certainly on my list of 'things to do'. I have ordered several certificates and hope that they will give me some more leads.

The 1881 census shows George Goddard, cab proprietor, living at 25 Artillery Row, Westminster.

The 1891 census shows Caroline Goddard, widow, living in Kintbury, Berks. Elizabeth Goddard Emms was present at her death, but I could not find her on the census. It is believed that she was employed in service, possibly to a royal household. But I am not certain of this fact, and if it is true, by whom was she employed?

I have ordered films of the 1871 census, Westminster, but they have not yet arrived. I hope that I can find the family there. By 1881 the family structure had changed considerably. Caroline was widowed and living with her married daughter, Caroline Goddard Hotston in Wimbledon. George was a widower with two small children ages 2 and 1. Elizabeth Goddard Emms was also a widow, trying to keep up the business as Licensed victualler in Southwark, Surrey, while her son Tom, age 7, also lived with the Hotstons in Wimbledon. It is this Tom Emms that is my paternal grandfather.

The research I do free for my own interest. If you wished to add a little to your next years Goddard Association subscription it would be very acceptable.*

*Penelope Fletcher, who is a descendant of David Goddard, William senior's brother, and lives at 35 The Pentlands, Kintbury, Hungerford, Berks RG17 9XB, had a look at Kintbury Burials register. Fortunately the current copy was on display at the May Fayre last Monday and she was able to consult it. The entry reads as follows*

*Caroline Goddard High Street, Kintbury 23rd February 1905 aged 84*

*Penny writes that the workhouse was on the High Street, but it is also lined with cottages (I am supposed to be going there for a sketching day tomorrow, but the weather forecast is that it may be a bit cold and rainy and I'll probably give it a miss). There is no mention of the other church in Hungerford, Christchurch, so Penny thinks that Caroline is buried in St Mary's churchyard, the parish church high above the banks of the Kennet and Avon canal. She will try to find a moment to look at the churchyard plan, supposing the vicar has it.*

*When my husband and I were in Wiltshire Record Office we found the assistant who was cataloguing the Savernake Estate records. I will write and ask if she can tell us which farm William rented. I enclose a booklet which we purchased from Easton Royal church on a visit last week. It is in an idyllic situation and we took some photographs and will send you one. Is there any possibility of you making a visit to see for yourself?*

*Many thanks for your reply which I will pass on to Mrs Edna Woloshyn in Ontario. If you could, at your leisure, locate the grave on the churchyard plan I am sure Mrs Woloshyn would be delighted. She might be able to visit this country and come and have a look at the place where her reat great grandmother is buried.*

*I do not think that Caroline was in the Workhouse. Her husband William's will settlement in 1875 shows a balance on £3,150 16 6. William and Caroline were brought up in Easton where he was a tenant farmer, I think of the Marquis of Ailesbury and also the village carrier. They sold up and moved to London where William started off as a groom, but worked his way up to be a cab proprietor. Caroline had come back to this area to die bringing with her Elizabeth Goddard Emms (also widowed), her daughter in law and former publican in Southwark. William's father, another William, was the brother of your great-great-great grandfather David Goddard, though seven years older.*

Dear Julie,

I have waited until this weekend because the Registers have been brought out from the archives for the Document Display which often accompanies the Street Fayre.

Fortunately the right Register was present and I am pleased to say that I was able to go straight to the entry which reads:

"CAROLINE GODDARD HIGH STREET, KINTBURY 23RD FEBRUARY,  
(1905) AGE 84"

The officiant was Mr. Edwards who was vicar of Kintbury for many years - there are photos of him.

The fact that Caroline evidently lived in the High Street (tho I have to say that the old Work House was in the High Street) and there is no mention of Christchurch, would indicate that she was buried in St. Mary's. I have searched for a gravestone but if there was one it is possible that it was "tidied" in the 70s when broken or fallen stones were moved to the churchyard walls. I will go on looking. I don't think that Caroline could have come from the Work House because it would have said - I think, so probably she lived in one of the cottages that line the High Street which stretches from the crossroads - or Square as it is called, to the Templeton corner.

I have tried to take a photo of the entry and the church and corner where I think she might have been buried - I am not a good photographer but if they come out I will send them on to you.

I will enquire about the graveyard plan and see if anything comes up.

William Goddard was a cab proprietor in Westminster. His son George took over the business. William died without leaving a will and the estate was divided between his wife and five surviving children - Elizabeth, George, Caroline, Robert & Rebecca

Elizabeth Goddard married Thomas Emms in 1871. They ran the Fishmongers Arms in Southwark, Surrey until Thomas Emms died in 1880 aged 39.

Their only son Thomas Emms migrated to Canada at an early age.

After the death of Caroline Kimber Goddard, Elizabeth Emms emigrated to live with her son, Tom.
